Percent of Teachers in New Orleans Public Schools from 2003-2014 by Race

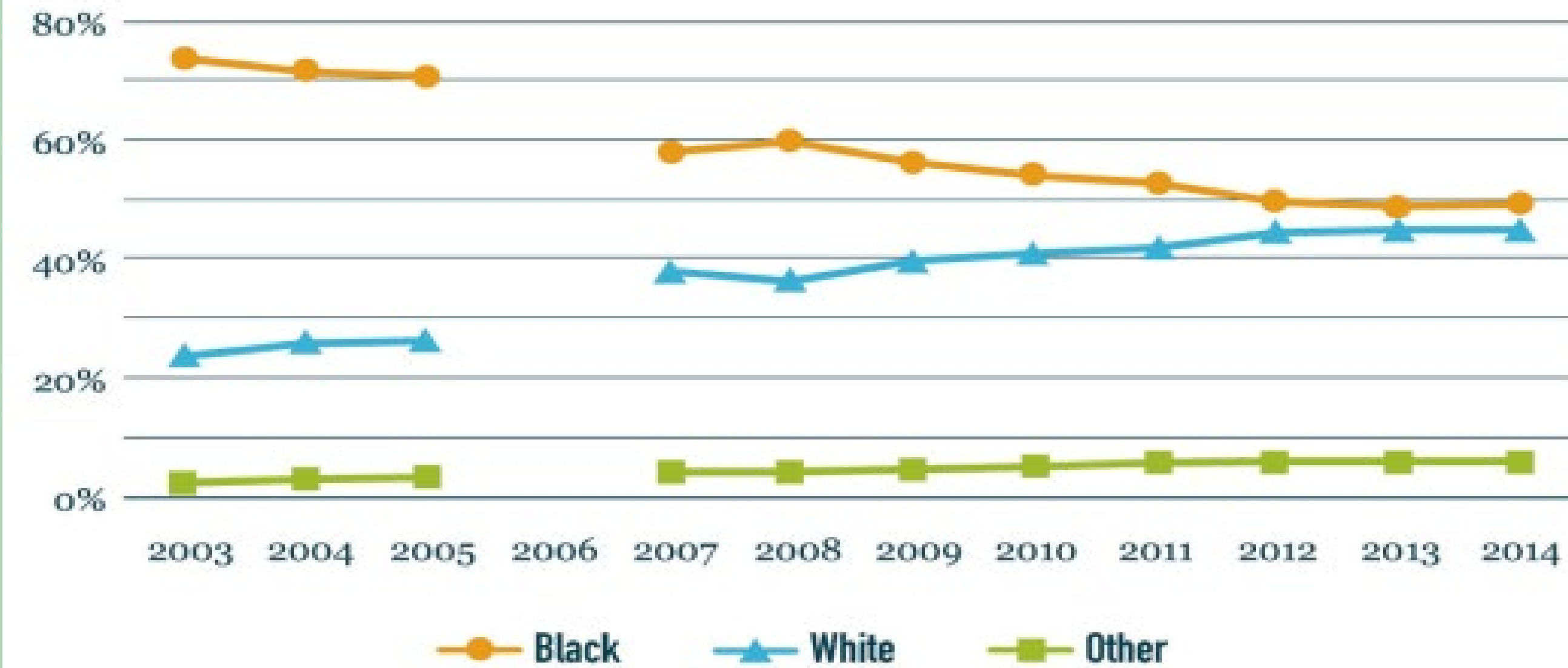
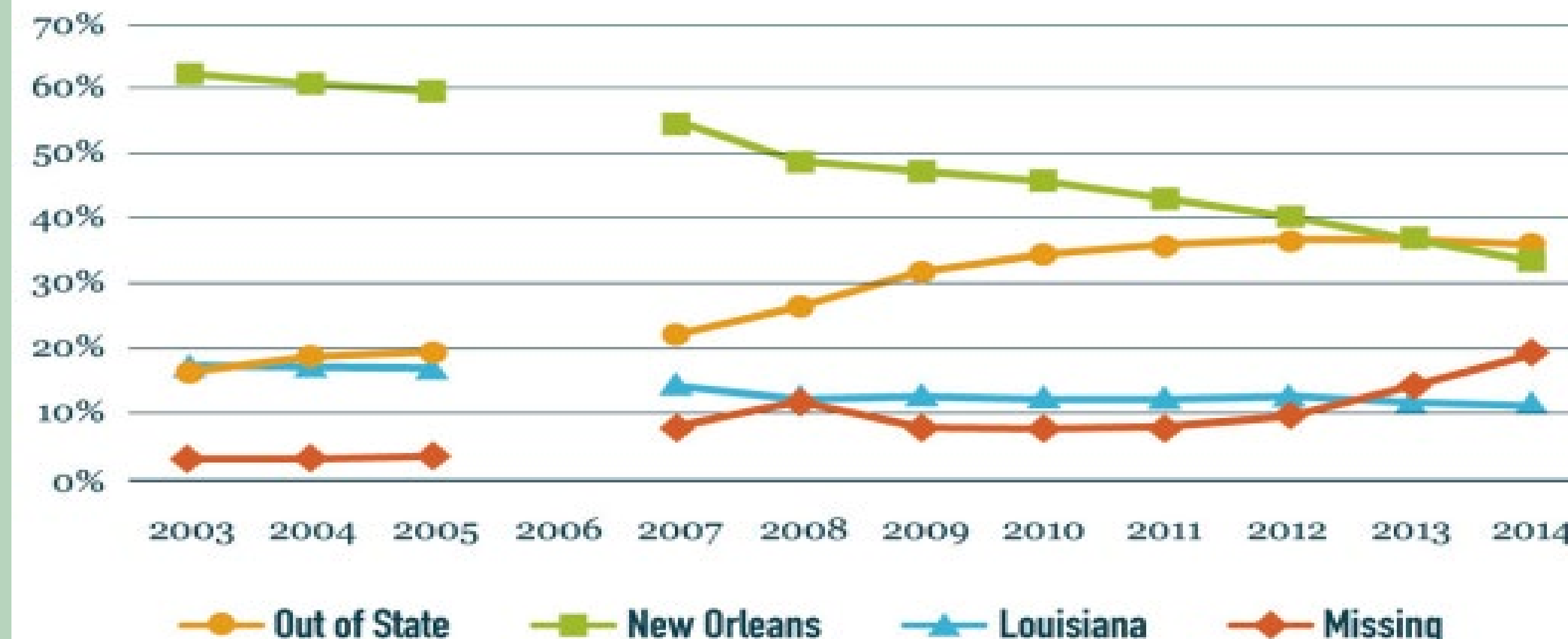


Figure 3: Location of Teacher Undergraduate Institution

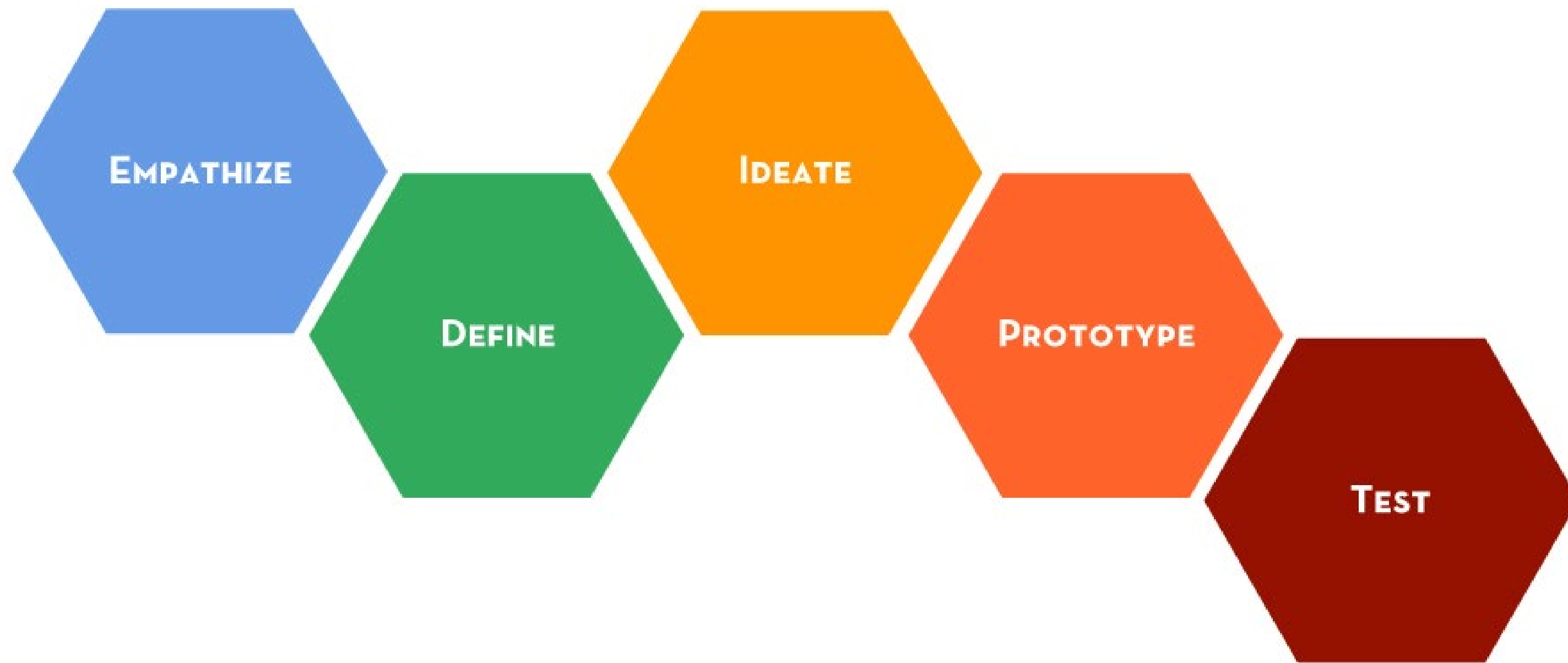




